Inclusiveness Network Report 2024 South Carolina Synod Assembly

The Inclusiveness Network was very active during 2023 and early 2024.

In April 2023, four members of the Network participated in a Civil Rights Pilgrimage in Georgia and Alabama with the Southeastern Synod.

Book studies on *The Color of Compromise*, *How to Heal our Divides*, (*Volume 2*), and *Dear Martin*, led by various people via Zoom and live. Pastor Leroy Cannon brings together a group roughly every other Tuesday that includes AME and Lutheran Christians for conversation and fellowship.

Orangeburg Lutheran Church has been hosting viewings of movies about racial reconciliation. The Inclusiveness Network advertised for and participated in a viewing of *Four Little Girls* there along with members of the SC State and Orangeburg communities. Pr. Rick Mason has made deep connections in the community there that are opening up healing conversations.

About 30 folks visited the International African-American Museum in Charleston on October 7. We met for conversation afterward at St. Matthew's Lutheran Church. The stories of African-American contributions to agriculture, religion, arts, and the cultural life of United States were well told and moving to all who went.

Support for a Watch Night Service on December 31 at Reformation Lutheran Church. This African-American tradition of watching for the new year to begin was a great celebration for all who attended.

The Network participated in a Martin Luther King Jr. Day Service at Ascension Lutheran Church on January 14, 2024. Worship was led by Pr. Jackie Utley and members of the Church of God in Christ.

Took a Civil Rights Walking tour in Columbia (February 10, 2024). This was coordinated through USC's Civil Rights program and Columbia63. About 15 people participated in this tour, which looked at local monuments and sites in downtown Columbia as well as an exhibit at the Columbia Art Museum. Even long-time South Carolinians learned history that they hadn't been exposed to before.

Pastor Christopher Girardeau approached the Inclusiveness Network this year about starting a task force discussing gender justice. That team has met a few times and plans to start a book study in the near future.

Over the last year, the Inclusiveness Network has shown growth in diversity, in numbers, and in experiences. Lutheran Disaster Relief Carolinas 2024 South Carolina Synod Assembly

We began our work in both North and South Carolina Synods early in 2023 by introducing ourselves and the work of LDR Carolinas at large group events with a display table, a survey form, and the opportunity for many personal conversations. We attended the Lutheran Men in Mission annual gatherings, Women of the ELCA annual gatherings, and synod assemblies in both NC and SC.

The congregational disaster preparedness survey forms that we received at these events helped us to learn about congregations and individuals, particularly their current levels of preparedness, interest in more information, and desire to help others after a disaster.

After several of those large gatherings, we planned meetings with conference leaders, especially in coastal areas of both synods, to talk with them about our ministry and offer to visit with individual congregations.

We have also been meeting with congregations and congregational councils who want to learn more about disaster preparedness and/or response. Sometimes that has involved temple talks about the work of Lutheran Disaster Response and LDR Carolinas, preaching for a worship service, meeting with an adult forum to talk about individual preparedness, or meeting with congregational leaders who are interested in developing or updating a congregational preparedness plan. We encourage congregations to discuss ways that they are interested in responding to disaster in their communities and beyond.

We have been in contact with conference deans and rostered leaders following events in their congregations or communities from an apparent heart attack during worship to a shooting on the UNC Chapel Hill campus. We responded to the EF3 tornado in Eastern NC by applying for and receiving an LDR Solidarity Grant to assist affected members of the community with unmet short term needs not covered by insurance or other resources.

We have participated in quarterly meetings of both NC & SC VOAD (Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster) to develop relationship with other organizations and individuals providing disaster services. We participated in called meetings before and after major events, including the EF3 tornado in eastern NC in July, Hurricane Idalia, and Tropical Storm Ophelia. We are also serving on the National VOAD Preparedness Committee.

We have shared information with others via our website <u>www.ldrcarolinas.org</u> which includes a resource page and a blog. We also have a Facebook page <u>www.facebook.com/ldrcarolinas</u> which we have used to post information about events and response to disasters, and a YouTube page <u>www.youtube.com/@LDRCarolinas</u> with recordings of our online network meetings and book study.

With financial assistance from the NC Synod Heilig Resource Center, the NC Synod Michael Peeler/Virginia Casey Grant Fund, and the SC Mission Fund, we have planned projects and events for 2024, including a book study on **A Ready Hope**, work to upfit the NC Synod trailer for disaster response, a service trip to assist Craven County (NC) Disaster Recovery Alliance with ongoing recovery work following Hurricane Florence in 2018, congregational preparedness mini-grants, and more.

Planning Team: 200th Anniversary of the South Carolina Synod South Carolina Synod Assembly 2024

On a cold day in January of 1824, four Lutheran pastors in the Midlands of South Carolina determined they would begin a new Synod for the congregations that had emerged during the previous decades. "Gathering at St. Michael's Lutheran Church, now in Irmo, to form an independent Synod of their own – the Synod of SOUTH Carolina – and Adjacent States . . . The meeting was opened with "singing and prayer," exactly as we open our Synod Assemblies today, 200 years later. They elected the Rev. Godfrey Dreher as the first President of the Synod until the next meeting – what we today, would call, a bishop." (From Dr. Susan McCarver's presentation for the 175th Anniversary of the South Carolina Synod in 1999)

These facts summarize the rather inauspicious beginnings of our Synod. However, by the end of 1824, Pr. John Bachman of St. John's Lutheran Church in Charleston had agreed to serve as President of the new Synod and the number of congregations in the Synod had also grown by several hundred percent. In the Synod minutes from 1824, the record showed that the Synod budget was \$34. Much of it came as single dollar contributions, but Pr. Bachman was listed as having given \$20 of that amount. (No wonder they elected him President of the Synod).

During the last two centuries, the South Carolina Synod would grow to include more than 150 congregations and more than 50,000 members. More importantly, by the end of the 19th century, the ministry of the Synod would reach Japan and beyond. God's actions in this state also resulted in significant social changes in the state and the growth of a wide variety of institutions that would address the needs of education, care for society, environment, elderly people and a host of other issues and concerns. The 20th century brought many these institutions to maturity. And the last decade of that century also brought the Synod into the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

So many things have happened during the last 200 years of ministry that celebrating them all will take more than a year. And our celebration will culminate during the Synod Assembly of 2025. To address the needs of storytelling and history celebration, the Synod Council formed a committee for the 200th Anniversary of the South Carolina Synod. This committee has been diligent during 2024 in planning how we will address the 200-year story the South Carolina Synod and its members throughout the state. Already the planning team has produced a logo and "History Moments" released on eNews, *Lutheran Living*, SC Synod. An Introduction to the 200th Anniversary Year [1824-2024] was released in January. This was followed in February with an African America Focus, and in March "History Moments" on Ladies Sewing Society (1825), Women's Memorial Lutheran Church, and Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies. A video will be a part of the South Carolina Synod Assembly on June 8, 2024, featuring interviews with The Rev. Dr. James Aull, The Rev. David Donges, The Rev. Dr. Herman Yoos, and The Rev. Ginny Aebischer. These four bishops have served the South Carolina Synod since the formation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Because it is so multi-faceted, the story of the South Carolina Synod is not an easy story to tell. Nevertheless, telling it will enable us to find inspiration and hope for our future. Truly the South Carolina Synod has been blessed in many ways. God has been working in our state as we have shared together in witnessing to our faith. And, most importantly, the last two centuries have provided a tremendous foundation for the ministry that will unfold in this century and beyond.

We give thanks for all of God's blessings and pray that our life together will grow stronger through our celebration events during the coming year.


