## The Gift of Stewardship as the Mission of the Church The Rev. Dr. Dan Bell, Presenter

Stewardship is a struggle. Notwithstanding our prodigal God, American Christians do not give away very much. Why is this? Exploring this enigma prompts consideration of the story that the practice of stewardship tells about stuff and about God, why we have what we have and the relation between stewardship and being. This first session concludes with the idea that stewardship is what God has given us because God wants more and better for us than we could ever ask or imagine.

The struggle that is stewardship is linked to a mission problem. The tiny god of much contemporary stewardship is not able to provide a mission big enough to hold the attention of the average young person. Our mission problem is exacerbated by our edifice complex, our too frequent confusion of church with a building and associated programming and staff. We humans want to be part of something meaningful, larger than ourselves. Stewardship is nothing less than God's gift of a big enough mission to satisfy our restless hearts. God gives the gift of stewardship as an opportunity / invitation to be drawn out of the darkness of ourselves and into the ecstatic joy of communion/community. Which means that stewardship is not about giving to the church but about the church giving itself away to, for and with the world. What does leading the church in giving itself away entail? How do we share the gift of the mission that is stewardship? We will consider issues of leadership, character (personal and corporate congregational) and, finally, the cost of culture change and the need for courage.
