Lutheran FAQ: What is Christmas About?

We give gifts to each other on Christmas because Jesus is God's gift to us and to remember the wise men who brought gifts to Jesus. What is the best gift you have received? What's the best gift you have given?

When has Christmas been especially joyous? When has it been hard? What helped you to celebrate or as you struggled?
Did you know that St. Nicholas was real? Where do you see the original story showing through in Santa Claus traditions?
The Christmas story comes to us in Luke 2 (with prequels in Luke 1) and Matthew 1-2. They're really different versions of the same events. What do we learn about God in each telling?
One of the stories for the Sundays in the Christmas season is about Herod's horrible massacre of the infants (Matthew 2:13-23). The people in power reacted to God's love with violence. What does that say about humanity? About God?
What questions do you have about Christmas?
